



What is the Robert F. Sibert Award?

The medal is awarded to the author(s) and illustrator(s) of the most distinguished informational books for children, ages 0-14, published in English in the U.S. We have a manual with terms, definitions, and criteria that guide our note-taking, discussions, and decision. Unlike Miss Olivia's committee, our discussions are top-secret! The committee is made up of 9 individuals; I worked with librarians from CA, TX, ND, IL, MN, MD, and OR. Only we know the full list of titles we discussed this year...

How many books do you have to read for the committee? Publishers sent books to my house, and I also checked out a lot from the library. In total, I read about 550 books this year!






What is the ALSC Notable Children's Books Committee?

This committee works to create a list of recommended titles for teachers, librarians, and students of the previous year's most notable titles. This list features books for ages 0 to 14. We hold public discussions three times a year to discuss and evaluate the titles based on criteria such as "acceptability by children" and "originality of text and illustration," among others.

How many books do you have to read for the committee? We read all eligible books that are written for ages 0-14. That can range year to year. This year, I evaluated close to 3,000 titles!
